

A Time to Remember

The well know verses in Ecclesiastes 3 referring to a time to do / a time for, have been mentioned quite a few times on the radio since peace was proposed for the war in Gaza, particularly "a time for love and a time for hatred", "a time to kill and a time to heal", "a time for war and a time for peace". Let us pray earnestly that it is indeed a time for peace and healing for both Palestinians and Israelites.

November is a time to remember those who have been killed in the many conflicts over the past years, the Two World Wars and more recent and ongoing ones. Remembrance Services are held throughout the Uk and some European countries on the 11th day of the 11th month at 11am [or nearest Sunday], the day that the Armistice was signed by Germany to end World War 1. [Armistice means 'an agreement for peace'].

There are different kinds of 'Healing' including Medical, Emotional, Spiritual /Religious and Mental which require different approaches.

Anne Holloway recently led a Healing Service at Abbey Hill which focused on prayer, during which she outlined the number of ways in which prayer healing can be accessed at our church. In large number of ways it turns out There are general intersessional prayers at every service during which time the names of those known to us who have specific prayer needs are read out from the Prayer Book which Jo Williams compiles before the service.

There is the prayer circle to which these names are passed for further prayer, [to become a member of the prayer circle ask George to add your email to the group]. People may also ask George to circulate names of ones they would like prayers for to the prayer circle.

Inside the front cover of the magazine is the prayer diary, where in alphabetical order the names of the congregation appear against a day of the month for inclusion in people's personal prayers. There is also a Healing Group which meet regularly to plan healing services. There is the opportunity for healing by the Laying on of Hands.

Anne asked for our views on this. How comfortable are each of us is with this taking place in a service, [at the front of church before the dais, on the dais, at the back of the church], after the service in the vestry once, twice or three times a month. Please leave your thoughts (anonymously if you wish) in the prayer box in the porch.

Another way to pray is after Coffee Pot on Thursdays, 11.30 for around 20 -30 minutes. Issues / concerns are mentioned then silent or voiced prayers follow. It is enough to be present as Jesus said 'When 2or 3 are gathered in my name I am there.'

After someone has died there is a time to remember what that person meant to us personally, to their family and to the organisations, groups that they may have been part of in their lifetime. I recall that when my father died and the children [aged 15-26] were coming to their first family funeral that I told them not to be upset that at the Wake, if along with sadness there was a lot of laughter as memories were recalled. Laughter can be part of the healing process, along with hugs. Sometimes when words are hard to find or utter, hugs can express a great deal.

Prayer is the most important part of being Christian. Christ prayed with his disciples and went off into quiet, lonely places to pray. We are told that he prayed for an hour in the Garden of Gethsemane, followed by two more periods of prayer. If it was important to Christ to pray how much more important is it for we mortals to pray!

P.U.S.H. Pray Until Something Happens A Banner hangs on the wall in church urging us to do this!!

HARO HORSFIELD – A TRIBUTE FROM SARAH AND FAMILY

Harokuku Avoha, Haro to her friends and 'Betty' to myself (Sarah) and Ellie was born in the village of Keke in the Gulf province of Papua New Guinea on May 26th 1946... or 1948! The family story goes that grandfather Avoha, known as Bubu, (the PNG term for an elder or grandparent), mixed up the years with her sister Sairi and so her actual year of birth is not known - but her British passport said 1946 so many years later mum was extremely pleased to be getting her pension 2 years early!

Mum was the youngest of six siblings and as a young girl went to church boarding school and later became a primary school teacher on one of the London Missionary Society mission stations where she met Donald and they married in 1971. Six years later I was born in Port Moresby, PNG, and in 1979 my beautiful younger sister Elizabeth (Ellie) was born in Bolton, England. Shortly after Ellie's birth we all moved to Cambridge Terrace Congregational Church in Wellington New Zealand for a couple of years where we had a very happy childhood with lots of memories of swimming in the sea, cycling and where mum honed her cooking skills and gardening skills growing flowers and vegetables.

In 1982 we returned to Westhoughton, Lancashire and lived with Grandma Doreen, Dad's mum, for a few months before moving again to Abbey Hill Church, Kenilworth. We always considered 24 Greville Road to be our family home.

During many wonderful years living in Kenilworth, raising myself and Ellie, Haro made many special friendships and became a much loved and valued member of the community. However there came a time for another change. Mum and Dad decided to relocate to their second home, Church Stretton, a place where we had enjoyed many family holidays, delighting in its natural beauty and as many of you know and have joined them both on, incredible scenic walks. I'm sure it reminded mum in some ways of her childhood days playing in the PNG hills that surrounded her village.

As she had in Kenilworth, mum fully embraced the joys of living in Church Stretton, making many great friends and again becoming an active member of the church community and getting involved in church groups and being an elder. Being a typical teenager I wasn't really aware at the time of how involved and committed and selfless mum was with her role as 'minister's wife' – her very good friend Jane will say more about this significant part of her life separately.

Mum was also an incredibly devoted and generous wife to Donald; leaving her whole family to move to NZ and then England with only very occasional visits back to PNG

She was also an incredibly strong, caring and resilient woman; she nurtured Ellie through her mental health issues and then breast cancer before Ellie tragically passed away in 2018. We all still miss Ellie very much. While still living in Shropshire and not long after Ellie's passing mum beat the odds and overcame necrotising fasciitis becoming a 'necrotising fasciitis survivor' in 2021. An incredible triumph! But, just after being given the all clear, she was then very sadly diagnosed with leukaemia which she also faced with her characteristic stoicism and positivity.

In 2023 mum and dad returned to Kenilworth to be closer to family and good friends. This meant that she was nearer her grandson's Reuben and Joseph and she was able to visit us all in London a few times — memories of which we will cherish.

At this time she was given first rate care at the wonderful Aylesford Unit, Warwick Hospital to whom we are extremely grateful. I'm sure the nurses and other patients won't forget the lady who had most of the transfusion unit singing along to UB40's Red Red Wine.

For the last 4 years myself and James have been lucky enough to be looking after mum, which has meant plenty laughs, great times and interesting long conversations about everything and anything. Although we knew this day was coming mum's passing still has come as a shock to us all.

She was beautiful inside and out and loved flowers, snacks (sweet and savoury), having fun, her grandsons, spicy food, daytime TV, anything tropical, dancing and bright colours.

When there is no peace

They dress the wound of My people as though it were not serious. "Peace, peace," they say, when there is no peace. (Jeremiah 6:14)

I wonder what peace felt like in 1945, after 9th May or 16th August? These, of course, were the days after Victory in Europe Day and then Victory in Japan Day. Once the parties and hangovers were cleared up, life would go on as before, for many months to come: with shortages, rationing, men overseas, houses bombed and people on the move. On the continent and in the Far East it was much worse.

What does it feel like now? Yes, we have had 'peace' of sorts in most of Europe between the major continental powers for decades, which is an achievement, but there is no peace in Ukraine, the Middle East or Sudan. If anything, the world is now looking to be a more dangerous place.

This verse from the prophet Jeremiah was the theme of a sermon recently. The preacher talked about peace making, peace keeping and a lasting peace, which are not the same and require different skills. In and after the Second World War peace making meant winning the war and defeating evil. Peace keeping was occupying the defeated lands until they could establish communities built on democracy and justice. (The preacher was born exactly nine months after either VE or VJ Day, so he was a 'child of peace'!)

What about a *lasting peace*? Many world leaders say, "Peace, Peace" but they mean only *peace on their terms* and do not care about anything else.

As Christians we should:

Pray for the *peace makers*: the women and men in the forces Pray for *peace keepers*: the experts helping to build new societies Pray for *lasting peace*: the willingness of world leaders and politicians to act for the greater good.

Remembering Lord Tennyson

It was 175 years ago, on 19th November 1850, that Alfred, Lord Tennyson became Poet Laureate of the UK until his death in 1892. He succeeded William Wordsworth and became known as the poet of the Victorian age.

Born in Somersby, Lincolnshire, in 1809, he was one of 11 children of a mentally unstable and embittered clergyman. All the surviving children, some of whom were talented individuals, suffered at least one mental breakdown.

Tennyson wrote poetry from a very early age and used it as a distraction. It was not until he went to Trinity College, Cambridge that he became happy, partly because he was popular there and partly because of the close four-year friendship he struck up with the brilliant Arthur Hallam, who sadly died young.

In the 1830s and 40s Tennyson published many poems and was granted a £200 pension by the Prime Minister, Sir Robert Peel, but it was in 1850 that everything changed: he married Emily Sellwood – an author in her own right – and the elegies on Hallam that he had been writing over the years were published as In Memoriam, to great acclaim from reviewers, public and Queen Victoria herself, leading to his appointment as Poet Laureate.

He and his wife moved to the Isle of Wight, and for the rest of his life he lived there or in Surrey. He was granted a peerage by Gladstone in 1883. His accumulated poetry, admired technically for its imagery, verbal dexterity and underlying melodies, came to epitomise the age he lived in, where established Christian faith was challenged by scientific doubt.

Towards the end of his life there was criticism of his style from newer schools of poetry, but a more balanced view now prevails, with a widespread recognition of his greatness.

Sullivan - of Gilbert and Sullivan

Some 125 years ago, on 22nd November 1900, Arthur Sullivan, the British composer, died. Best known for his collaborations with the dramatist W S Gilbert on light operas including *HMS Pinafore* and *The Pirates of Penzance*, he also wrote the music to the hymn *Onward, Christian Soldiers*.

Sullivan was born in 1832 in Lambeth. His Irish-born father Thomas was a military bandmaster, clarinettist and music teacher who, from 1845 to 1857 was based at the Royal Military College, Sandhurst, where his son became proficient on many of the band's instruments and composed an anthem, *By the Waters of Babylon*, when he was eight.

Arthur was drawn to classical and spiritual music of various kinds, and his huge success with Gilbert was awkward for him, as he often felt – encouraged by certain reviewers and others – that he was "capable of higher art". He was knighted by Queen Victoria in 1883, and the musical establishment felt this should end his involvement with comic opera.

Sullivan was inclined to agree, but he was also aware of the quality - and popularity - of his work with Gilbert. He had told an American reporter in 1879: "His ideas are as suggestive for music as they are quaint and laughable. His numbers ... always give me musical ideas."

By 1885 the duo had completed *The Mikado*, their most successful work, which ran for 672 performances.

Sullivan never married, though he had close relationships with a number of women, including the American socialite and singer Fanny Ronalds. He was devoted to his mother and also to his nephews and nieces after his brother Fred died at an early age.

Persistent kidney disease often meant that Sullivan had to conduct sitting down. He died of heart failure following bronchitis. His *Te Deum Laudamus* was performed posthumously.

'He gave us eyes to see them': Zubaran's 'Jacob and his twelve sons'

In the Old Testament the story of Jacob is a vivid saga of struggle and conflict: Jacob vies with his brother Esau, he has a difficult time with Laban, there are tensions in his family, and finally he wrestles with a divine stranger. And yet in the book of Genesis his days end with promises from God: he will be blessed with descendants, a land, fruitfulness and the assurance of God's presence with him. He is given a new name and a new destiny as 'Israel.' We sense all this struggle and blessing in a remarkable series of thirteen paintings, 'Jacob and his twelve sons' by the Spanish artist, Francisco Zubarán.



They hang in the dining room of Auckland Castle at Bishop Auckland. Bishop Auckland grew as a thriving market town and then in the industrial age became the centre of the Durham coal industry. It was also the site for the prince bishop of Durham's palace. In the medieval period the bishop was as powerful as the monarch of the land, with an army that rivalled the king's own forces. Auckland Castle became the country seat for the prince bishops, and in the 18th century Bishop Richard Trevor made the palace more Gothic and imposing than ever before. To mark the 1753 Act that allowed Jews to be naturalised in England, he purchased the portraits of Jacob and his sons by Zubarán for £124.

Zubarán normally painted monks and saints, and this particular series was meant for the colonies. But they were seized by pirates and then sold to a London merchant. The one depicting Benjamin was bought by Lord Ancaster, and so Bishop Trevor was only able to buy twelve. He commissioned Arthur Pond, a jobbing painter, to make an exact copy of Benjamin to complete his set. The series of canvases, each eight feet tall, was in the news recently when there was a possibility

they might be sold. They were saved by a Trust, now dedicated to developing the site of the Castle, which includes not just the dining room, where the paintings hang, but a very fine chapel of St Peter, a throne room, and beautiful gardens.



Jacob and his sons are each painted against the daylight sky, and each has its individual characteristics. Judah for instance is clad in a brown and gold garment with a gold circlet crowning his head as the ancestor of King David and Joseph, the husband of Mary. Gad is a strong soldier. Jacob, the father of these twelve sons, is a bearded old man, bowed down with the weight, not just of his years of struggle, but perhaps also the burden of destiny laid on his shoulders as both a blessing and a responsibility. For in the Old Testament, we learn that God often chooses the ones overlooked by the world: the young boy David above his more likely brothers, Isaac above Ishmael, and in the saga behind these impressive paintings of Zubarán, Jacob, the second born son, but here blessed as the father of God's people.

Who Cares? Do you?

The church recently invited 'Reyousable' a business run by a family in Leamington who offer household items that are mostly free of single use plastic.... But little plastic that has been reclaimed from the sea is used very sparingly to give talk about their business and products to the church. The other churches in Kenilworth and District were invited.

The support was somewhat disappointing, both from Abbey Hill and the other churches. Those present were obviously impressed by what they heard and saw as many products were purchased.


